I. Welcome and Introductions

Notification of the Executive Finance Committee Meeting scheduled for September 25, 2025, was sent to the Pensacola News Journal, and posted to the Coalition Public Calendar Board on September 5, 2025. The meeting was called to order by Ms. Nickinson.

II. Public Comments

None.

III. Consent Agenda

Upon a motion made by Mr. Thompson and seconded by Ms. Jackson, the Consent Agenda, consisting of the Agenda, Financial Reports for June, July and August 2025 and Minutes of July 24, 2025, was approved without objection.

IV. Coalition Status Reports

a. Financial Update

Through August the Coalition spent \$4.3 million of the \$19.4 million SR grant which is 22.1% of the grant. SR Admin was 1.2%, Non-Direct Services was 11.2% and Quality was 6.5%. VPK Services was \$203,191 of \$4.8 million which is 4.2%. VPK Admin spending was 4.8%.

b. Enrollment/Wait List Status Report

There are 2,364 children enrolled in the School Readiness Program of which 63 are SRMAT and 1,054 are school-age children. There are 463 children on the Wait List. There are 1,816 children approved for VPK for 2025/26 Program year of which 1,447 are enrolled.

c. Contracting and Fraud Summary Report

There are 82 SR providers and 67 VPK providers.



V. Committee Recommendations

VI. Old Business

a. DEL NOA dated 25AUG25

A new NOA was issued on August 25, 2025. An additional \$3,068,865 million, primarily in the School Readiness Program, was awarded.

b. <u>Updated Funding Projections for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 and DEL Response</u>
Funding projections for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 were updated upon receipt of August 25, 2025, NOA. With additional funding, the Coalition will be able to have 2300 children in care.

c. A-133 Contracts Approval

The contract with Carr, Riggs & Ingram was presented to for discussion. Upon a motion made by Ms. Nickinson and seconded by Mr. Thompson, it was approved without objection to taking the Carr, Riggs, & Ingram contract to the Board.

d. Introduction of New Finance Director

The new Finance Director, Mr. Thomas Porter, was introduced to the Committee.

e. ED Search Update

The ED's newest departure date is now December 22, 2025. Mr. Watson has offered to stay as a consultant to help the transition with whoever gets hired as the new ED.

f. Update on Change to IT Support Services Contract

IT support with Digital Boardwalk is working out very well. The only adjustment having to be made is the understanding that due to having a third party for IT support, there may be slight delays in getting a response to issues.

g. Gubernatorial Board Appointments and Total Board Membership

The Coalition still needs someone to put in an application to be the third applicant for a Governor appointed Board member. If none of the current board members want to apply, the Board Chair might have to advertise the opening to recruit someone to apply. Additionally, the Board would benefit from having at least two more private sector members.

VII. New Business

a. Early Learning Conference 28SEP25

The Coalition hosted Early Learning Conference will be held on September 28, 2025 at UWF. There will be around 200 early educators in attendance. There will be about 27 sessions held. Gulf Coast Kids House, FDLRS and other organizations will be in attendance. There were many



businesses in the community that donated items for goodie bags. Lunch will be provided by Portobello Market.

b. Revised FY 2025-2026 Budget Summary

The revised FY 2025-2026 Budget Summary, that reflects the additional funding awarded in the August 25 NOA, was presented to the EXCOM Committee for discussion. The two biggest changes were that funding was increased for quality initiatives and providing additional SR services. Upon a motion made by Ms. Nickinson and seconded by Mr. Thompson, it was approved without objection to take the revised budget summary to the Board.

c. 2024-2025 Financial Review Report

The 2024-2025 Financial Review was presented to the Committee. There were no findings to report and two observations. The Financial Review will be presented to the Board in November.

d. 2024-2025 Accountability Review Final Report and CAP

The Final Report and Corrective Action Plan (CAP) of the 2024-2025 Accountability Review was presented to the Committee. There were four findings.

- (1) Finding: Two coalition staff went past the 5-year deadline for their background screening renewal. CAP: Procedures have been implemented to keep this from happening again.
- (2) Finding: The DEL claimed that all SR Tier 1 desk reviews were not completed. The Coalition provided proof that all Tier 1 reviews were completed but DEL still said they were not done. CAP: The system to track Tier 1 desk reviews was updated.
- (3) Finding: The Coalition had an insufficient number of applications on file with the Governor's Appointments office for the three unfilled Governor appointed Board positions. CAP: The DEL wanted new proof that the Board was informed that more applications were needed for Gubernatorial appointments. A draft copy of the minutes of the August Board meeting was provided to DEL.
- (4) Finding: There was nothing stated in policy regarding the responsibility of CCRR to support providers and recruit new providers. CAP: CCRR revised a policy to more clearly state their role in supporting and recruiting providers.

e. Robinson Appeal

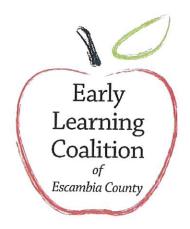
Ms. Robinson was terminated from her position as a member of the Coalition staff on August 26, 2025. She was terminated due to insubordination and being suspected of being involved in committing fraud on her daughters' vouchers. Ms. Robinson claimed to have documents to prove that she committed no wrongdoing in her daughters' cases. Ms. Robinson was given until noon on September 22, 2025, to provide the documents to be given to the EXCOM. She failed to provide any documents, nor did she give any other response. All this information was provided for discussion. The EXCOM Committee agreed the there was no need for the Board to change any actions of the Coalition. Therefore, Ms. Robinson's request to be reinstated was not acted upon.
